Col. Jerry C. Jones assumed the duties as the Chief of Staff of the United States Expeditionary Contracting Command on May 5, 2012. He most recently served as Deputy Chief of Chief of the G3 Mission, Operations and Intelligence directorate from September 25, 2009 to May 4, 2012. Previously, he was the Commander for the 1/401st Army Field Support Brigade at Camp As Sayliyah, Qatar. Col. Jones is a 1987 graduate of the University of Texas at El Paso, where he earned a commission in the U.S. Army through the ROTC program.

He has held numerous command and staff positions during his 25 years in the Army. Col. Jones' operational assignments include: petroleum/water platoon leader, company executive officer, 82nd Airborne Division property book officer; commander Headquarters and Alpha Company, 782nd Main Support Battalion; 2nd Infantry Division, Division Support Command Support Operation Officer, Branch Chief Petroleum/Water, U.S. Army Central Command; Joint Petroleum officer, U.S. Central Command and Commander, 1/401st Army Field Support Brigade, U.S. Army Expeditionary Contracting Command, Chief of Operations and Intelligence.



Col. Jones' deployments include Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm, Kosovo Force Bosnia Herzegovina and International Military Assistant Training Team Sierra Leone, West Africa, Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom.

He is a graduate of the Quartermaster Officers' Basic & Advanced Courses, Command and General Staff College, Combined Armed Services School, Joint and Combined War fighting School, Parachute Rigger Course, Jumpmaster Course, and the Standard Property Book-Redesign Course. Col. Jones is currently enrolled in Defense Acquisition University receiving Defense Acquisition Workforce Improvement Act Level I Certification and acquiring his master's degree Florida Institute of Technology in Acquisition and Contract Management.
